SEA SUNDAY 2025

STELLA MARIS (FORMERLY APOSTLESHIP OF THE SEA)

Stella Maris is the largest ship-visiting network in the world, and the official maritime charity of the Catholic Church. Seafarers often have to work away from their families and local communities for nine to 12 months at a time. Across the world, they aim to provide a 'friend in every port' and stand alongside seafarers and fishers to ensure their rights are upheld. For 100 years we've been extending the hand of friendship and welcoming seafarers and fishers to our shores.

History: Stella Maris was founded in Glasgow in 1920 by a group of Catholic men and women with the founding belief that every seafarer deserves fair working conditions and respect for their human rights. The shipping industry has changed dramatically in the last 100 years and our work has evolved to make sure we can still meet the changing needs of seafarers today, but our mission to provide care and support for the people of the sea remains the same.

Their network of chaplains and volunteers makes more than 70,000 ship visits each year and supports hundreds of thousands of seafarers and fishermen in times of need. They have 220 Chaplains supporting seafarers globally, 750 volunteers in ports around the world and visit seafarers in 54 countries.

Work: Life at sea can be difficult. Seafarers and fishers can suffer from loneliness, depression, spiritual deprivation, and even exploitation. Our chaplains and volunteers visit hundreds of thousands of seafarers and fishers every year. They listen and chat, they arrange Mass onboard ships, they offer practical help in a crisis and bring free Wi-Fi onboard so seafarers can call home. Often, these simplest practical kindnesses make the greatest difference.

Mission and ethos: Their mission is to support seafarers and fishers spiritually, practically, and emotionally. The Catholic faith is at the heart of Stella Maris, it inspires, enlivens, and motivates our work, and is expressed through a loving care of the people of the sea of all faiths and none.

Collaboration: Stella Maris collaborates with other organisations, including the Mission to Seafarers, to support seafarers, and make an even greater impact on their welfare. They often partner on various initiatives and projects.

Issues facing seafarers: Over 90% of world trade is carried by sea, providing work to 1.89 million seafarers. Shipping is a truly international industry: in today's global market, you might have a Greek-owned vessel, registered in Malta, with officers from India and a mixed crew from Thailand, Indonesia, Vanuatu, and the Philippines.

Shipping provides people with many opportunities. However, it is also one of the world's most dangerous occupations, with piracy, shipwrecks, and abandonment just some of the threats seafarers face. Seafarers are often expected to work very long hours, and sometimes even past the end of their contract. They suffer mental health issues, which can be sparked by poor conditions and long working hours, as well as money worries and even the loneliness which comes with spending so much time away from family and friends back home. Seafarers are cut off from their loved ones for months on end – sometimes up to a year. Less than 25% of ships have Wi-Fi, and phone signal can be scarce. Lack of communication can have a huge impact on seafarers' mental health and their relationships. Ship abandonment is a surprisingly common event, where the ship owner has ceased communicating with their ship for more than eight weeks. Unscrupulous vessel owners abandon their ships due to financial problems or legal disputes. The ships are left in port or at anchorage, often due to money having dried up for port costs, unloading fees and/or wages. Seafarers have to remain on board abandoned vessels during this eight-week period to ensure that they are paid any wages owning to them. Piracy is a very real issue which remains one of the biggest dangers faced by seafarers to this day. Despite the number of piracy cases thankfully dropping in recent years, there has still been an increase in hijacking at sea, kidnapping and violence. Shipwreck and fatal accidents at sea can be caused by dangerous weather conditions such as storms, hurricanes or typhoons, which can come on quickly and on occasion prove deadly. Accidents can also occur as a result of collisions or groundings. Seafaring remains a highly hazardous occupation, affecting the safety of seafarers and their emotional and spiritual welfare.
