DECEMBER 1965 - DECEMBER 2025: THE SECOND VATICAN COUNCIL AND US

'In another world it is otherwise, but here below to live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often.' Saint John Henry Newman wrote this in his Essay on the Development of Christian Doctrine which was published in 1845, the year he was received into the Catholic Church. Many of his ideas were to influence the 20th century theologians who, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, were paving the way for Second Vatican Council. In fact, Newman is sometimes called the Father of the Council. His ideas on the importance of the laity (that's us) and the development (not change!) of doctrine are reflected in many of the Council's final documents.

'Vatican 2' was an ecumenical council of the Church which meant that nearly 2,500 bishops and theologians from all around the Catholic world participated, the largest such gathering in history. It was very specifically a pastoral council which means that it focused on inspiring



and guiding the faith of Christians rather than defining doctrine and condemning heresies (previous Councils had tended to present their teaching in 'anathemas', in effect cursing those who didn't believe the doctrines that were promoted. In the whole of this Council's teaching there is only one anathema, against 'vast and indiscriminate destruction' through the deployment of 'scientific' weapons in war).

The Council was called and opened by Pope Saint John XXIII in October 1962 and it was closed by Pope Saint Paul VI on 8 December 1965 (the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.) So, this weekend is almost exactly the 60th anniversary. In his opening address, Pope John made clear the aims of the Council as he envisaged it: that the central truths of the faith be guarded and taught more effectively; for Christians to address their energy to actively seeking the Reign of God; and to articulate the doctrine of the Church for our age: 'it is the presentation of the Faith with which we are concerned here and our approach to this will be a thoroughly pastoral one'. Above all he established a change of tone towards the world and its errors: 'today we prefer to make use of the medicine of mercy rather than that of severity ... by demonstrating the validity of our teachings rather than by condemning others'.

The famous story of Pope John showing his Cardinals why he had called the Council, by flinging open a window in the Vatican, can be interpreted in different ways! Did he mean that the Church needs to let in some fresh air, blow away the cobwebs to reveal its true lineaments, or that the Church needs to release her greatest treasure into the world, the truth of Jesus Christ? Perhaps it is both: the ultimate purpose of the Council was to evangelise the whole world (this is where we come in), but it would do so by re-presenting her central doctrines and re-engaging the People of God with them. A few days after announcing his resignation in 2013, **Pope Benedict XVI** gave an address with some reflections on the Council. He said that the reform agenda set by his predecessor was a 'revolutionary pastoral act': no longer would the Church simply contrast its teachings to the errors of the modern world, but she would show how what was of value in cultures could be elevated by the teachings and practices of the Catholic faith.

The Council began its work focussing on the priority of worship in Sacrosanctum Concilium, (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy) encouraging the sacramental participation of the laity: 'the Church earnestly desires that Christ's faithful, when present at this mystery, should not be there as strangers or silent spectators' (this is perhaps where Catholics of a certain age notice the greatest changes in the Mass). 'The treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly so that a richer fare may be provided at the table of God's word.' This was followed by a re-definition of the Church herself in Lumen Gentium (The Light of the peoples) in which we are no longer simply the laity, passive in the pews, but the People of God: 'the common priesthood of the faithful and the ministerial priesthood are ... ordered to one another; each in its own proper way shares in the one priesthood of Christ'. Dei Verbum explored the treasures of Scripture as the revelation of Word of God: 'After God had spoken many times and in various ways through the prophets ... he sent his Son, the eternal Word who enlightens all people, to dwell among human kind and to tell them about the inner life of God.'

Perhaps the most ambitious and inspiring document is **Gaudium et Spes**, (Joy and Hope) on the Church in the modern world. It explores the human condition; humankind's forlorn efforts to make sense of itself without God; the true foundations of justice (social, economic, political) and of peace. From this 'pastoral constitution' have come the declarations of successive popes on our duties towards our fellow human beings and creation itself, not least in Pope Francis' remarkable letters to the world, **Laudato Si (Praise** be to you my Lord) and Fratelli Tutti, (All Brothers and Sisters) what we are increasingly coming to know as Catholic Social Teaching (once called 'the best kept secret of the Catholic Church'!) We have work to do, to bring Christ's resurrected life to the world, 'on earth as it is in heaven'
